



Actions Carried Out:	Examples:	Monitored by:
1) Supporting the embedding of biodiversity into decision making.	Reflected in the commitment to biodiversity and natural areas in the Council's Forward Development Plan 2023- 2027. Adopted a Climate Emergency Motion, committing the Council to review all procurement policies. Adopted an Allotment and Community Growing Strategy which established a Land Use Working Group involving community groups, to advise the Council in the use of it's land in the context of biodiversity.	Overseen by the Council's Environment Committee.
2) Raise awareness of biodiversity and safeguard species and habitats.	PTC regularly take part in Green Week, inspiring and educating the community about the small differences that can be made. We are a litter picking hub at two of our community locations and encourage the community to get involved. We also support and facilitate 'Balsam Bashing' events across the area. In the last 18 months we have transformed an area of waste ground into a functioning community garden in which the community has been heavily involved in every step of the way. The second stage of the project at Meadow Street will involve developing the large woodland area. Working with the community using no dig permaculture principles to care for soil and improve microbiome for sustainable food growing. Local schools now visit the community garden and get the opportunity to see nature and growing on their doorstep. Amended the Allotment Tenancy Agreement to encourage allotment holders to use alternatives to pesticides and herbicides wherever possible. Identification and conservation of native species in the community garden and woodland, volunteers are encouraged to attend training sessions and log species.	Through feedback from Council members and residents.

3) Increase the resilience of our natural environment by restoring and creating habitats.	Supported a local community group to move towards gaining ownership of a woodland where biodiversity will feature heavily. Began conversations with "Welcome to our Woods" to become part of their network. Ponty in Bloom runs yearly with hanging baskets and pollinator friendly flowers. Support 'No Mow' May. Created wildlife areas across several venues providing nesting and hibernation areas to encourage a range of species. Restored a woodland area with new saplings and created connecting corridors with living hedgerows and dead hedges.	Environment Committee. Town Clerk.
4)Tackle pressures on species and habitat.	Developed a knotweed plan to identify and tackle knotweed across our estate. Using battery operated tools and gardening methods that preserve native species.	Environment Committee.
5) Improve our evidence, understanding and monitoring.	Representatives have attend the Local Nature Partnerships meeting and used opportunities to take part in events and training sessions. Taken Advice from Natural Resources Wales with regards to the woodland and treatment of invasive species. Collect data on volunteers and visitors to various sites.	Management Team.
6) Have a framework of governance and support for delivery.	We are a litter picking hub and encourage organisations to use the equipment. Schools regulary take part in initiatives such as 'Sow Some Sunshine' and the 'Ponty Potato Project'. All projects are monitored by the management team and Environment Committee. The Council is playing a facilitation role to help joint working and networking. The Council has provided several small grants to external organisations that support environmental projects.
