## **Common Challenges**

Rural Community and Town Councils often find it hard to deliver services:

- Places are far apart and hard to reach.
- There is not much public transport.
- Internet and phone signals can be poor.
- People live in small, spread-out communities.

These problems make services more expensive to provide and with small budgets councils may struggle to do everything that is needed.

These problems also make it harder for people to get the help they require but councils are close to their communities and really understand what local people need. They can:

- Create services that suit their area.
- Work with others to find smart solutions.
- Help make sure support is fair, easy to access, and long-lasting.

Community and Town Councils are in a great position to help their areas, even when times are tough.

## What Does Rural Poverty Look Like?



#### Employment and Low Wages

- Lack of job opportunities, underemployment, seasonal work.
- · Commuting challenges.

#### Fuel Poverty

- High heating costs due to old housing stock and off-grid fuels.
- Disproportionate impact on older and disabled residents.

#### Digital Exclusion

- Patchy broadband/mobile coverage.
- Limits access to services, education, jobs.

#### Access to Services

- Long distances to GPs, shops, schools.
- Poor or non existent public transport.

#### Child and Family Poverty

• School meal reliance, food insecurity, youth outmigration.

#### Loneliness and Mental Health

• Isolation, especially for older adults and carers.

#### Rural Transport Challenges

Rural Wales faces:

- Few buses/trains
- Isolation for older, disabled, or low-income residents
- · Poor access to health services
- Limited options for young people
- High travel costs
- How Community Transport Helps
  Community Transport is local, non-profit, and run for
  the community: it can take many different forms:
  - Dial-a-Ride minibus services;
  - Volunteer car lifts;
  - Group and social trips

#### It helps by:

- Reducing isolation
- Enabling independence
- Improving service access
- Cutting carbon by sharing journeys

#### ▼ How to Get Started

- 1. Ask the community what's needed

- 3. Look at local examples
- 4. Start small one car, one volunteer
- 5. Seek funding local grants, Lottery, businesses
