Amid the cost-of-living crisis, Blaenavon Town Council has introduced many innovative initiatives to remove financial barriers, to ensure residents can access essential activities for health, well-being, and community

Community Wellbeing Days 2023 and 2024

The cost for this initiative in March 2023 was £729 and May 2024 was £871.

Council covered cost of film screening, refreshments and transport costs. The total cost for this initiative in 2023/24 was £2,567.

Total cost was £4645, but the cost to the Council was £2,500, as jointly funded by a grant from Torfaen Council using the shared prosperity levelling up grant.

The cost for this initiative in 2023/24 was £1018. The cost to the Council was £0 as this was funded by a grant received from Street Games, a Welsh Government initiative.

Challenges

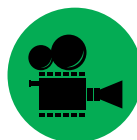
Faced with the ongoing challenges of the cost-of-living crisis Blaenavon Town Council looked at ways to engage with the community, provide free or low-cost activities, and work with local partners to ensure residents could access essential services without financial strain.

Solutions

- In March 2023 and May 2024, the Community Wellbeing Days brought together local organisations and 500 residents at each event, for a day of services and activities, resulting in positive feedback and plans for future events.
- The Cinema Befriending Club, running from 2022 to 2024, has successfully combatted loneliness through free monthly film screenings, engaging over 1,100 residents and securing ongoing support.
- The Outdoor Cinema Project this year provided 300 local residents with the opportunity to enjoy a free outdoor cinema experience against the beautiful backdrop of the Blaenavon Iron Works.
- The Community Swimming Initiative offered free swimming sessions to over 60 residents per session, promoting physical and mental health, with continuation planned for 2024/25.

Key Stages

Find out which Powers the Council requires

- 1 All community councils in Wales need specific legal powers that enable them to provide various services and support for their local communities. These powers, granted by legislation, allow councils to undertake a wide range of activities and initiatives to improve the well-being and quality of life for residents.

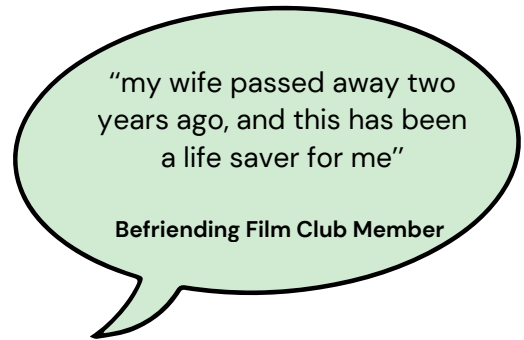
Carry Out a Risk Assessment

- 2 Conduct a comprehensive risk assessment to identify and mitigate potential issues that could arise during the event. This process should include evaluating safety hazards, planning for emergencies, ensuring compliance with regulations, and preparing contingency plans to address any unforeseen challenges.





Find out who you can Collaborate with

- 3 Actively seeking community-focused grant programs can provide financial support for council projects, while partnerships with local businesses, non-profits, and government entities offer shared resources and collaborative opportunities. These collaborations can drive innovation, boost community engagement, and lead to sustainable outcomes benefiting the entire community.

Powers Used by Blaenavon Town Council

-  **Community Wellbeing Day 2023 and 2024.**
This is authorised under S144 Local Government Act 1972 covering two elements of the activity namely – Power to provide facilities for conferences and exhibitions and also to encourage tourism.
-  **Befriending Film Club**
This is authorised under S137 Local Government Act 1972 (General Power) – Power to incur expenditure for certain purposes not otherwise authorised.
-  **Outdoor Cinema Project**
This is authorised under S145 Local Government Act 1972 – Power to provide entertainment and support to the arts including festivals and celebrations. It is also authorised under S144 Local Government Act 1972 namely – Power to encourage tourism.
-  **Community Swimming**
This is authorised under S137 Local Government Act 1972 (General Power) – Power to incur expenditure for certain purposes not otherwise authorised.
